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# Introduction

The Friends of Liberia organization enjoyed another successful, productive year in 2025. Our Annual Report provides details on our accomplishments, and here are a few highlights:

The Education and Health programs continued to build on their programming success of previous years. Each made excellent use of available funding and leveraged years of experience to ensure continuity with well-established programs. On the Education side, the Family Literacy Initiative and HIPHY Home Visitors programs both saw excellent results and continued growth. The Health team again offered Professional Development Workshops that were very well-attended, and which provided a dynamic learning environment for faculty and staff from health care institutions across Liberia. The Small Grants program continued its impressive growth pattern in 2025, with a total of 172 applications, of which 118 met eligibility qualifications, resulting in awards totaling \$25,000 dollars to 15 projects benefitting over 29,000 Liberians.

FOL continues to be a well-managed and financially sound organization. Membership grew modestly but meaningfully, with new members from the ranks of returned Peace Corps Volunteers, Liberian nationals, and others with connections to Liberia through their work with NGOs and religious communities. Our finances remain secure, giving the organization sound footing to manage and fund current and future programming. On the organizational development side, the number of individual donors increased year-over-year to 298 and, collectively, they contributed over \$122,000 to support our various programs. The Communications and Membership committees continued to be actively engaged in initiatives to keep members informed, and to reach out and engage prospective new members, both in the returned volunteer community as well as the larger community of people with ties to and an interest in Liberia.

The reports that follow detail the work done in each of our focus areas of education, health, and small grants development, as well as the work of our membership, communications, finance, and development committees in support of these focus areas.

# Education Committee

## The Family Literacy Initiative (FLI)

This year was the 10th year of the Family Literacy Initiative (FLI). WE-CARE, FOL, and Home Instruction for Parents and Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY) International launched the FLI in November 2015 after findings from a survey conducted by FOL members indicated that early childhood education was an unmet educational need in Liberia, particularly literacy and other basic skills needed to thrive in school.

The FLI has two components: the HIPPY Home Visitors program and the Adult Literacy Program (ALP). The HIPPY Home Visitors program uses the HIPPY curriculum to provide parents with training, educational activity packets, and other resources to help improve their child's literacy and school readiness. The training and resources are delivered by home visitors employed by WE-CARE. Miriam Westheimer of HIPPY International continues to provide resources and technical support as needed.

The ALP completed its sixth year and continues to offer a series of literacy classes using a curriculum designed to supplement the HIPPY curriculum for parents and other adults who want to improve their literacy as they help their children build readiness for school. ALP continues to serve HIPPY parents alongside community members.

WE-CARE remains dedicated as the on-the-ground implementer and facilitator for these programs, adapting the curriculum to the Liberian context, training and coordinating staff, and evaluating programs. WE-CARE has continued the programming in West Point, Caldwell, Duazon, Neezoe, and Nyemah Town. This year, ten signboards were placed in these communities to help advertise the programs. December 2025 marked the end of year 10 for FLI and closing and graduation ceremonies were held for both programs (including virtual livestream on Facebook), celebrating all five communities.

# Education Committee

## The HIPPY Home Visitors Program

HIPPY International is an early childhood development program built on the belief that learning begins at home, and that parents can play a critical role as educational partners with schools. HIPPY is designed to help parents prepare their preschool children for success in school and life, and to equip them with the tools, skills, and confidence they need to support their children's learning at home.

In Year 10 of the HIPPY Home Visitors Program, 218 of the 232 families completed the program. Within the first six months of the year, there was a zero percent drop rate, and the year ended with a six percent drop rate. The program worked with 233 children, and an additional 76 children (siblings and relatives) in families benefited from HIPPY at home.

## Adult Literacy Program (ALP)

The ALP curriculum is designed to work with the HIPPY curriculum, but the classes are not exclusive to HIPPY parents. There are two levels of the ALP: level one is for parents with very little literacy, while level two is a continuation of level one and is designed for parents who already have some basic literacy skills. In 2025, a microloan pilot for women was implemented with support from Women's Empowerment Initiative. This new pilot combined with ALP, integrates literacy, numeracy, and business skills into one program. In addition, the ALP classes continue to use the lighting systems purchased in 2024 by FOL to support classes at night.

Year 6 of ALP ended with 84 learners, including 60 learners in Level 1 and 24 learners in Level 2. Attendance for adult learners remains a challenge; thus, 60 learners were certified for completing their ALP levels, while 24 learners received participation recognition due to attendance issues. The graduation programs for ALP were held in each community in early December.

# Education Committee

## Tracking Study

The Friends of Liberia Education Committee's dedicated monitoring and evaluation team has been working to expand our previous report that tracks graduates from the HIPPY program. WE-CARE and the Education Committee's Monitoring and Evaluation group have been working on expanding the cohorts tracked in the tracking study. The goal of this study is to gather data on how students who have graduated from the HIPPY program are doing in school and to compare them with peers in the same classes. The group completed two publications in 2025, sharing the data from these studies.

The Cohort 5 Tracking Study provided qualitative and quantitative study results on Cohort 5 academic progress in 26 school settings. The report highlights findings such as "of the scores on 11 different subjects, the average scores on seven subjects were higher" for the FLI graduates compared to peers. 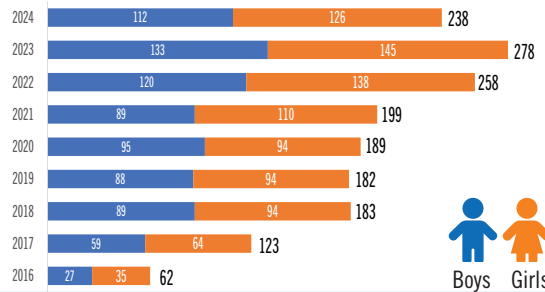

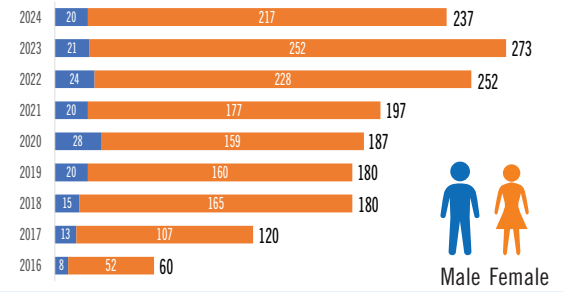

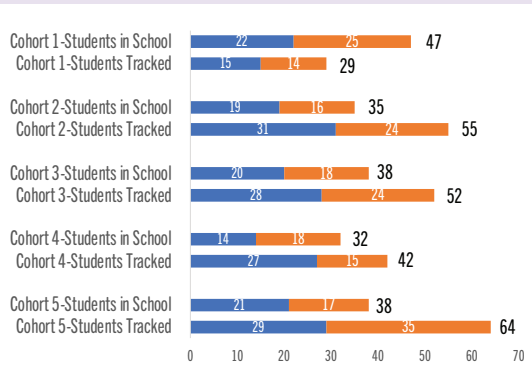
### Children Served (Duplicated Count)



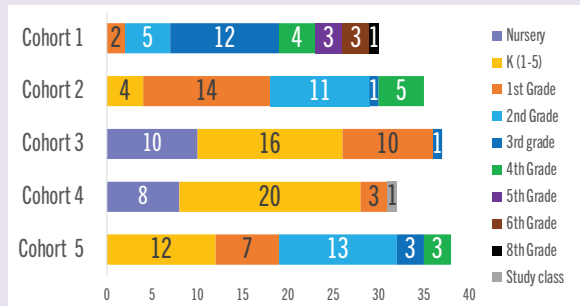

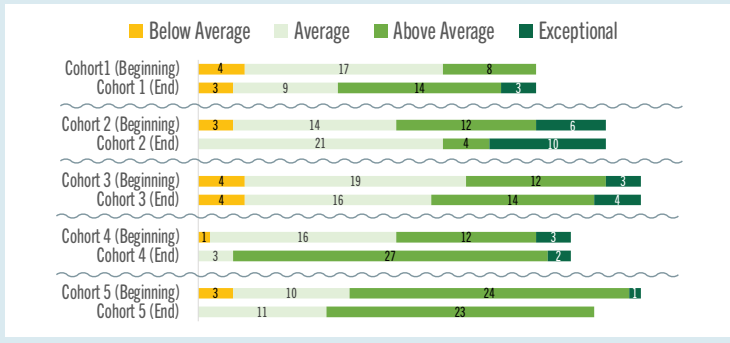

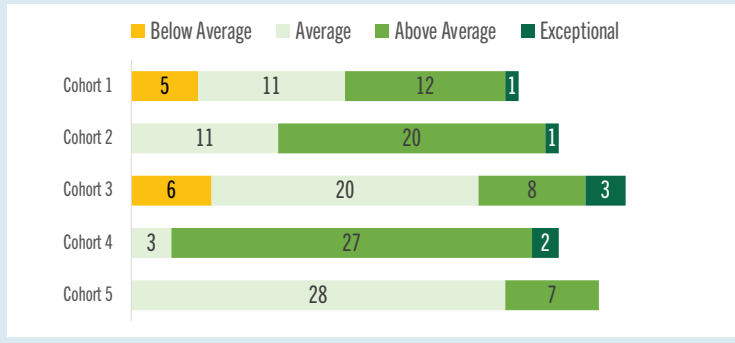

# Cohorts 1, 2, 3, 4 & 5 Outcomes

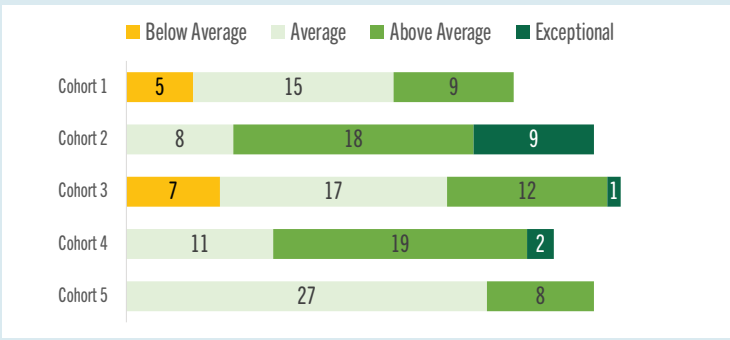
## Overall Academic Performance at the Beginning & End of the Year



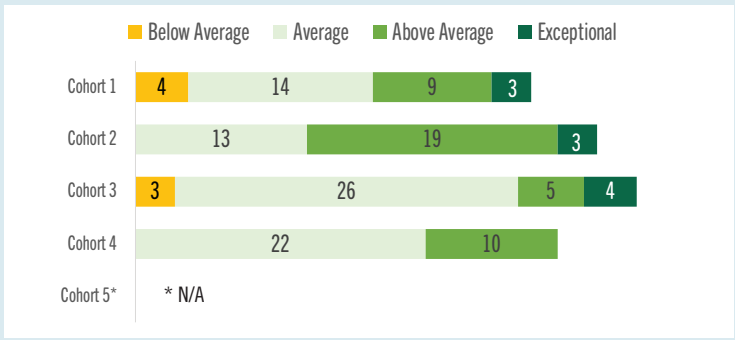
## English/Reading



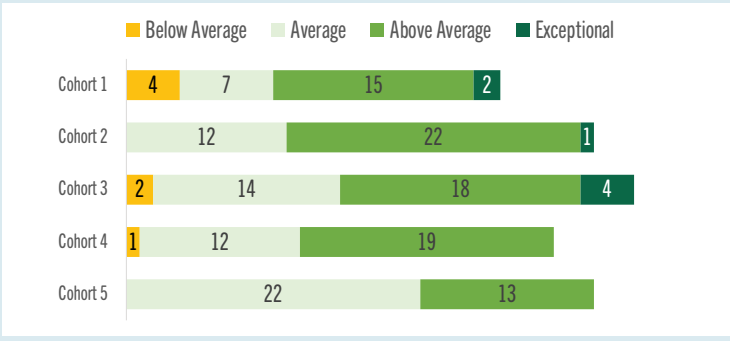
## Math Outcomes



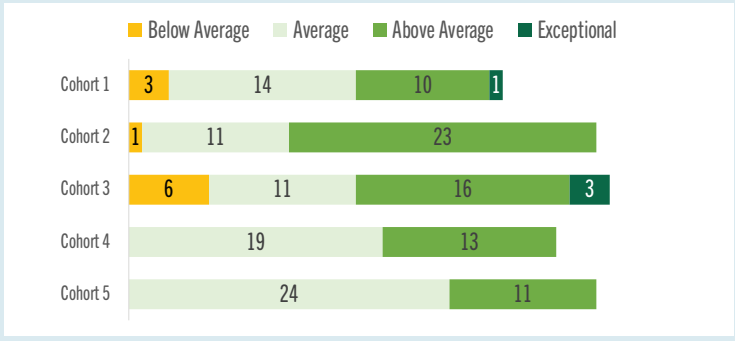

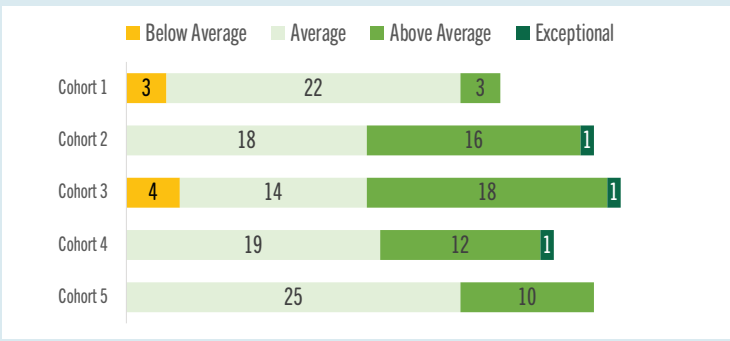

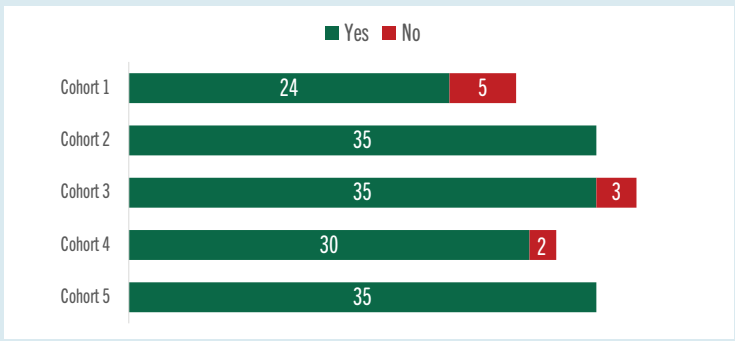
## Student Participation in Class

## Peter Town

Programming closed after teacher training was completed through a partnership between the Garden School and the Peter Town teachers in Gbanga.

## Early Childhood Development (ECD) Centers

WE-CARE continues to operate two ECD Centers in Nymeh Town area. In 2025, both Centers completed their first school year.

## Funding Overview

Comic Relief continued to fund the FLI at limited capacity this year. FOL donated \$12,900 to cover the 2025 budget shortfall, enabling full-capacity programming. Additionally, FOL donated \$50,000 in matching grant funds contributing to a \$125,000 grant through Comic Relief to provide funding support for both 2026 and 2027.

# Health Committee

With the support of the FOL US Health Team and GlobalGiving, FOL's Liberian Health Team (LHT) conducted a three-day workshop for nursing/midwifery faculty and a three-day workshop for practicing nurses/midwives in January 2025.

In-service training was provided to nursing/midwifery faculty and practicing nurses/midwives to provide evidence-informed and context relevant continuing professional development (CPD). The workshops also offered the opportunity for health professionals from across Liberia to share experiences, concerns and successes in their work.

## Workshop Schedule:

- Faculty Continuing Professional Development: January 6 & 7, 2025
- Joint Session (Faculty and clinicians): January 8, 2025
- Practicing nurses/midwives CPD: January 9 & 10, 2025

Twenty-two nursing/midwifery faculty and twenty-four practicing nurses/midwives from across Liberia attended their respective workshops. Two expert trainers from the Liberia Midwifery Association presented on postpartum hemorrhage, eclampsia, and birth asphyxia. The 2025 workshop was the first time the LHT administered pre- and post-testing online to measure the level of participants' achievement. Certificates of achievement were issued to all participants.

Workshop objectives included that the nursing/midwifery faculty would be competent in writing well formatted learning objectives and be knowledgeable and competent in evaluating their own institutional programs. Additionally, practicing nurses/midwives would be effective in handling postpartum hemorrhage, eclampsia, and birth asphyxia which are among the causes of maternal and infants morbidities and mortalities in Liberia. These efforts by FOL, through the LHT, align with the Liberian government's objectives to reduce maternal and infants morbidities and mortalities.

# Health Committee

An additional component of the workshop was for participants to share what they learned with other staff after returning to the clinics and hospitals where they are based. Consequently, the LHT was able to report several follow-up training events:

1. At Kolahum Hospital in Upper Lofa County, during a day long training, 26 staff were provided refreshing training in pre-eclampsia and eclampsia.
2. At F J. Grant Hospital in Sinoe County, 20 staff were provided an in-service training that included post-partum hemorrhage, eclampsia, and birth asphyxia.
3. At Government Hospital, Buchanan, Grand Bassa, 25 staff were retrained in post-partum hemorrhage, eclampsia, and birth asphyxia.
4. At Rally Time Hospital in Grand Kru County, 9 staff were trained in workplace ethics.

The US Health Team would like to thank the Liberian Health Team for its support of the work of Friends of Liberia. Members of the Liberian team include Chairman Edwin Beyan and Harriette Mondaye in Monrovia, Clinton Zeantoe in Ganta, and its virtual members, Peter Wainpa in Ghana, and Augustine Samorlu in India.

New Health Team Chair: In late December, John Langlois became the new chair of the FOL Health Team.

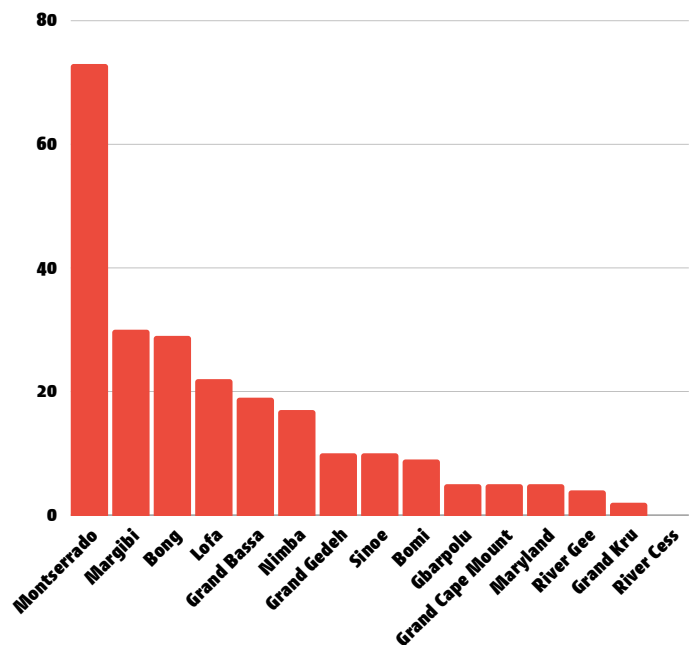
# Small Grants Committee

In 2025, the Small Grants Committee strengthened its role as a vital source of flexible, community-driven funding amid significant cuts to U.S. foreign assistance in Liberia. As the national development ecosystem faced major strain, the Small Grants Committee helped fill emerging gaps by supporting grassroots Liberian nonprofits with grants of up to \$3,000 alongside structured monitoring and capacity support.

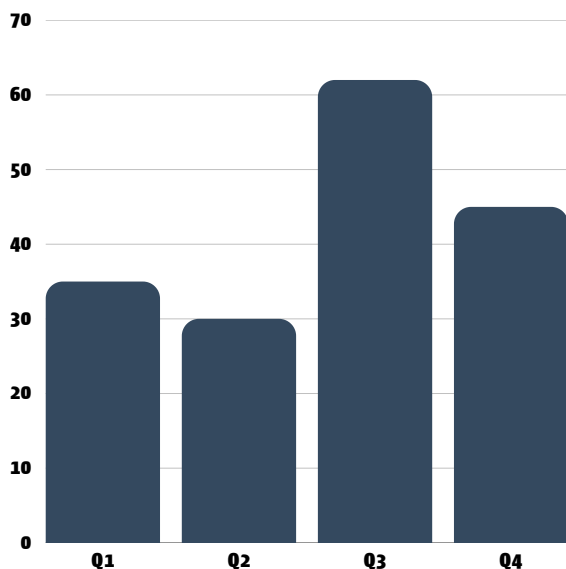
We received 118 eligible applications for funding in 2025. Of these, 70% were first time applicants, and 12 applications were from former grantees.

Project proposals spanned topics such as women and youth empowerment, education and literacy, vocational skills and livelihoods, agriculture and food security, health and WASH (water, sanitation, and hygiene), and environmental sustainability.

# Small Grants Committee

## What we funded

Highlights from some of our funded initiatives addressed:

- **Clean water access through well installation** reducing waterborne illness and increasing school attendance through HELP Inc.'s "Deep Well Water Hand Pump" project;
- **School sanitation improvements and SATO toilet installation** expanding access to safe sanitation facilities through GIRLS-Liberia's "Safe Sanitation for Safer Schools in Rural Grand Bassa" project;
- **Menstrual and reproductive health education for adolescent girls** creating access to safe sanitation practices and increasing school attendance through Our Children Future's "Menstrual and Reproductive Health Education" project;
- **Braille literacy training for visually impaired youth** improving accessibility and dignity for youth with visual disabilities through Lofa United Blind Association of Liberia's "Creating an Enabling Society for Visually impaired Children and Youth through Braille Education and Skills in Lofa County" project;
- **Library development and textbook provision** improving literacy engagement and school retention through Girls For Excellent "Performance's From Empty Shelves to Empowered Minds: A Textbook Project for Shankpallai Community School" project;
- **Trauma healing and psychosocial support** creating space for meaningful reflection and practical learning equipping participants with tools in stress management, emotional regulation, and community-based peace building through FREE Liberia's "Liberia Trauma Relief Program" project;
- **Cassava production and women/youth livelihood** strengthening increasing the income generation potential for vulnerable populations through Voinjama District Women Organization for Peace and Development Multipurpose Farmers Cooperative Society's "Reviving Cassava for Prosperity" project;
- **Road safety training and protective gear** for motorcycle riders contributing to road safety compliance and reduced accidents through Greater Life Foundation (GLOF)'s "Educating Motorcycle Riders on Traffic Rules and Regulations in communities of Grand Gedeh County, South-east Liberia" project; and
- **Health facility infrastructure rehabilitation** providing access to clean and safe health facilities for patients through Imani House Inc.'s "Clinic Roof Replacement" project.

# Small Grants Committee

## Strengthening the Grantmaking Process

In 2025, Small Grants continued refining its systems to improve transparency and accountability. The committee:

- Implemented a structured evaluation rubric assessing need, reach, organizational capacity, budget clarity, sustainability, and impact.
- Strengthened its three-phase Monitoring & Evaluation framework (baseline framework, mid-point monitoring, and final evaluation).
- Shared a new M&E orientation video and offered optional support sessions for grantees.
- Provided tailored written feedback and optional one-on-one sessions for applicants.
- Hosted virtual office hours to increase accessibility.

The Committee also developed a formal AI use policy (to take effect in 2026) to ensure proposals remain authentically community driven.

## Community Building & Communication

Beyond grantmaking, the Committee expanded engagement with Liberian nonprofits by launching a quarterly **newsletter** distributed to 190 organizations and maintaining a **WhatsApp Community** with 52 members for peer learning and real-time communication.

# Membership Committee

Membership in FOL grew modestly, but meaningfully in 2025, adding 70 new members in the year. The new members were an interesting mix of current Peace Corps Volunteers, returned PCVs, staff and family of staff who worked for Non-Government Organizations (NGOs) or religious organizations, as well as Liberians citizens. Some of the latter group hoped to leverage their membership with economic development opportunities.

Committee members focused efforts during the year on developing information channels for potential members of FOL and the work we do in Liberia. Meetings with the Peace Corps' Third Goal Office resulted with a commitment to brief volunteers closing their service in Liberia and provide them the opportunity to join FOL. In addition, the FOL Board produced a video about FOL which has proven to be a very useful recruitment tool. The current committee consulted with former membership committee volunteers to brainstorm additional ideas and recruitment strategies, including utilizing social media more effectively to reach potential members. In this vein, we hope to build the membership committee with individuals skilled in platforms that can be used to reach a broader audience of potential FOL members.

## Prepared FOL Board Members Roles and Responsibilities December

Based on an outdated FOL Board Member Roles and Responsibilities (R&R) document, the Communications Committee prepared a completely updated, comprehensive, 8-page R&R document. Shared draft versions with the FOL executive team, and then with the entire Board for input. The final version which was uploaded to the FOL website.

## FOL Facebook Page

The Communications committee regularly checks the FOL Facebook page to oversee posts and encourage information sharing about Liberia, Liberians, and Peace Corps work in Liberia. Approximately 1 or 2 posts, on average, are made each week. Inappropriate posts are removed as soon as possible.

# Development Committee

## Growing Support Sustains Friends of Liberia's Work

Our 2025 fundraising year reflected continued growth in support for Friends of Liberia. A total of 298 donors—twenty-four (24) more than in 2024—made 457 gifts totaling \$104,585.50. In addition, GlobalGiving donors contributed \$12,295.25, bringing the total raised in 2025 to \$122,834.44 with matched funds. While this total is lower than the exceptional results in 2024—which included a generous legacy gift from Gloria Saltzman, a Group IV Peace Corps Volunteer who served in Sanniquellie from 1964 to 1966—the increase in donors and sustained giving reflects the strong commitment of our community.

### **Funds raised in 2025 supported the following programs:**

- Adult Literacy Program: \$1,405.60
- Family Literacy Initiative: \$30,994.37
- General Fund: \$55,336.32
- Health Program: \$25,810.60
- Small Grants Program: \$9,287.24

These funds directly supported programs that strengthen education, health care, and community development across Liberia—helping families gain literacy skills, improving nursing and midwifery training, and supporting locally led projects that reach thousands of people each year.

The Rolander Family Foundation once again provided vital support for the Family Literacy Initiative (FLI). We are deeply grateful for this continued commitment. With the loss of USAID funding, the WE-CARE Foundation, a prime sponsor for FLI, needs sustained support more than ever. We also extend special thanks to FOL member Stephanie Vickers for helping to secure this support over many years. Her dedication has meant a great deal to WE-CARE and to the literacy programs serving families in Liberia.

Our two endowment funds with the Greater Washington Community Foundation continue to grow under professional management. We have also received legacy pledges from FOL members who have included Friends of Liberia in their estate plans. Strengthening these endowments is one of the best ways to secure the long-term future of our work. **20**

# Development Committee

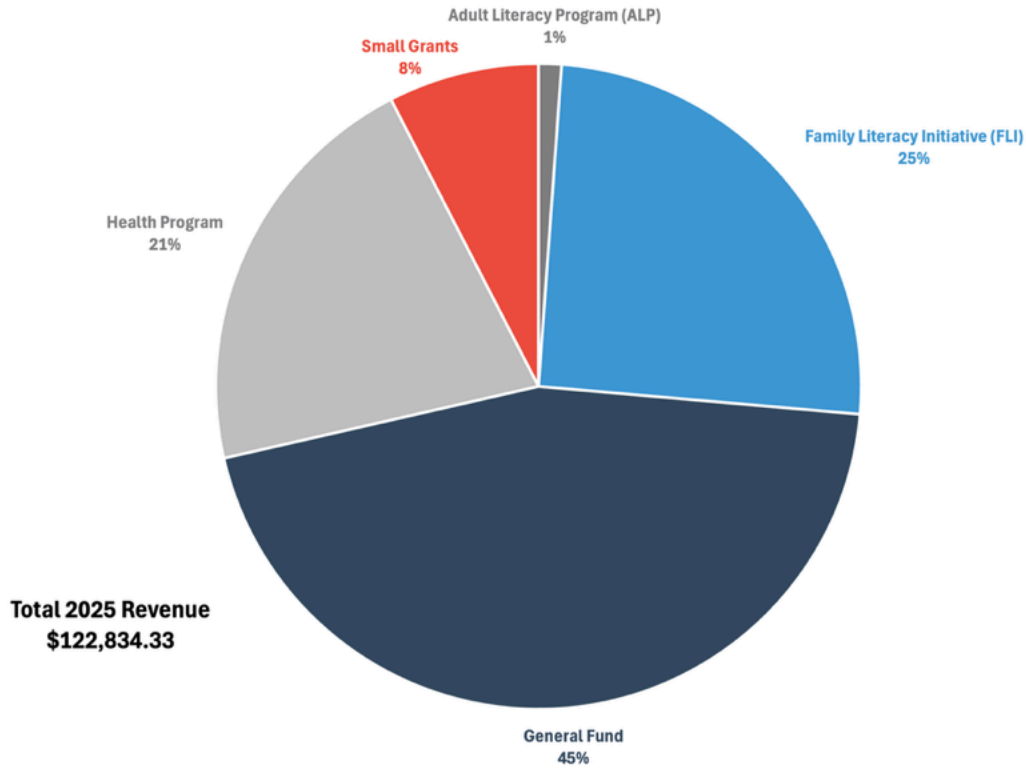
In addition to meeting our annual obligation to submit non-profit financial information to the IRS (Form 990 which is published on the FOL website), our financial statements provide FOL members and donors a better understanding of how the organization is performing from a financial perspective. They also help our Board of Directors carry out multi-year planning and budgeting. As good stewards of member and donor contributions, we believe it is essential to be transparent in all financial matters. Our Statement of Financial Position as of December 31, 2025, shows total Current Assets of \$410,569.58 consisting mostly of cash in the bank of \$215,336.08 and a CD investment of \$103,643.16. Additionally, FOL has Endowment Fund investments held by the Greater Washington Community Foundation and includes the FOL Legacy Circle Fund (\$57,988.67) and FOL Emergency Fund (\$31,252.07). The cash balances as of December 31, 2025, were allocated/earmarked for FOL's programs and operations as described in the Fund Balances report below:

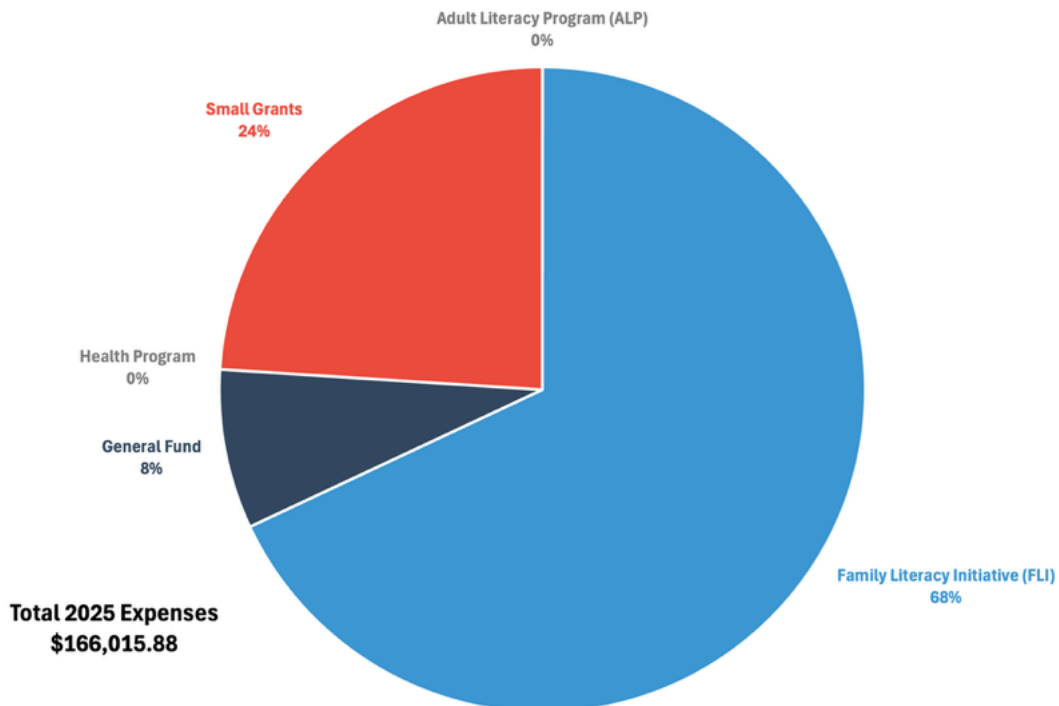

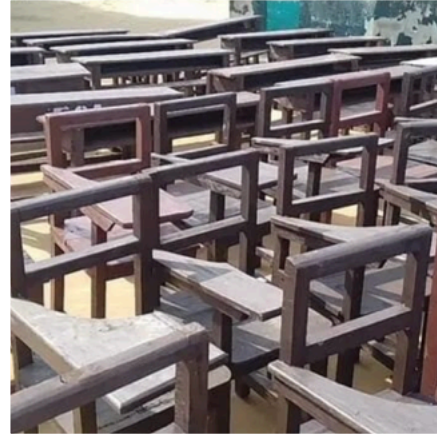
